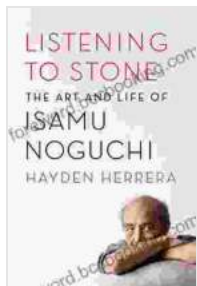

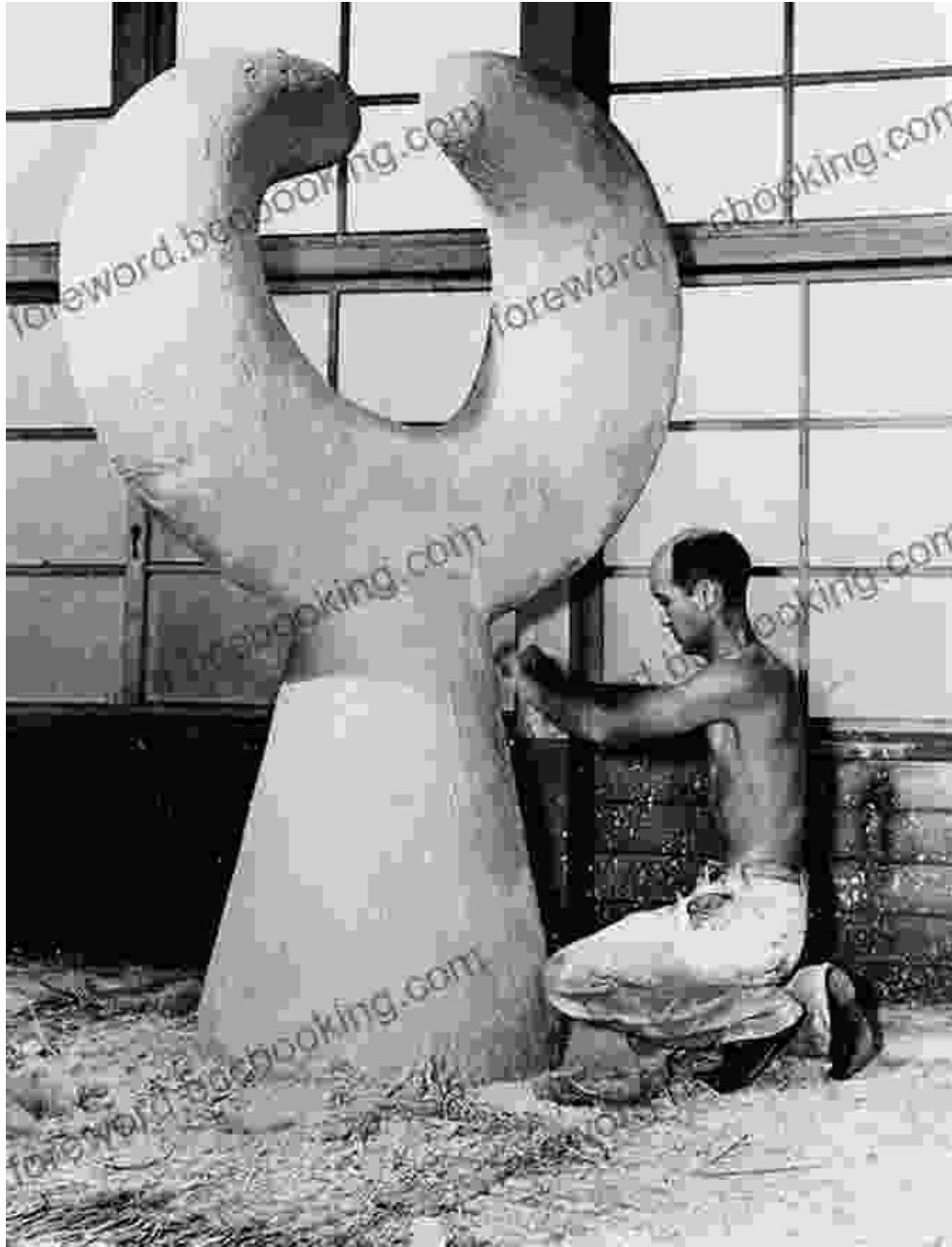

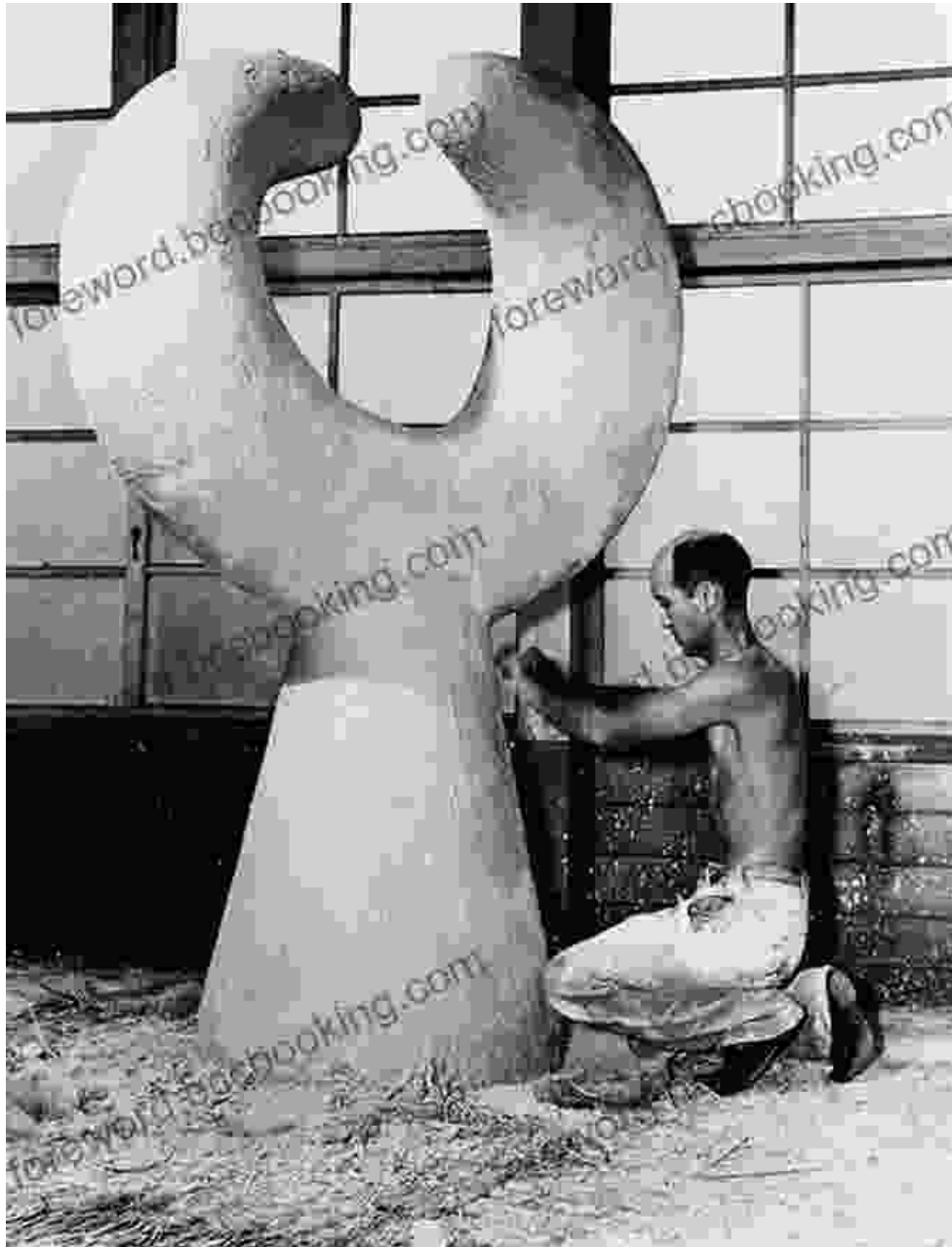


"Akari Light Sculptures 1H" by Isamu Noguchi, 1951

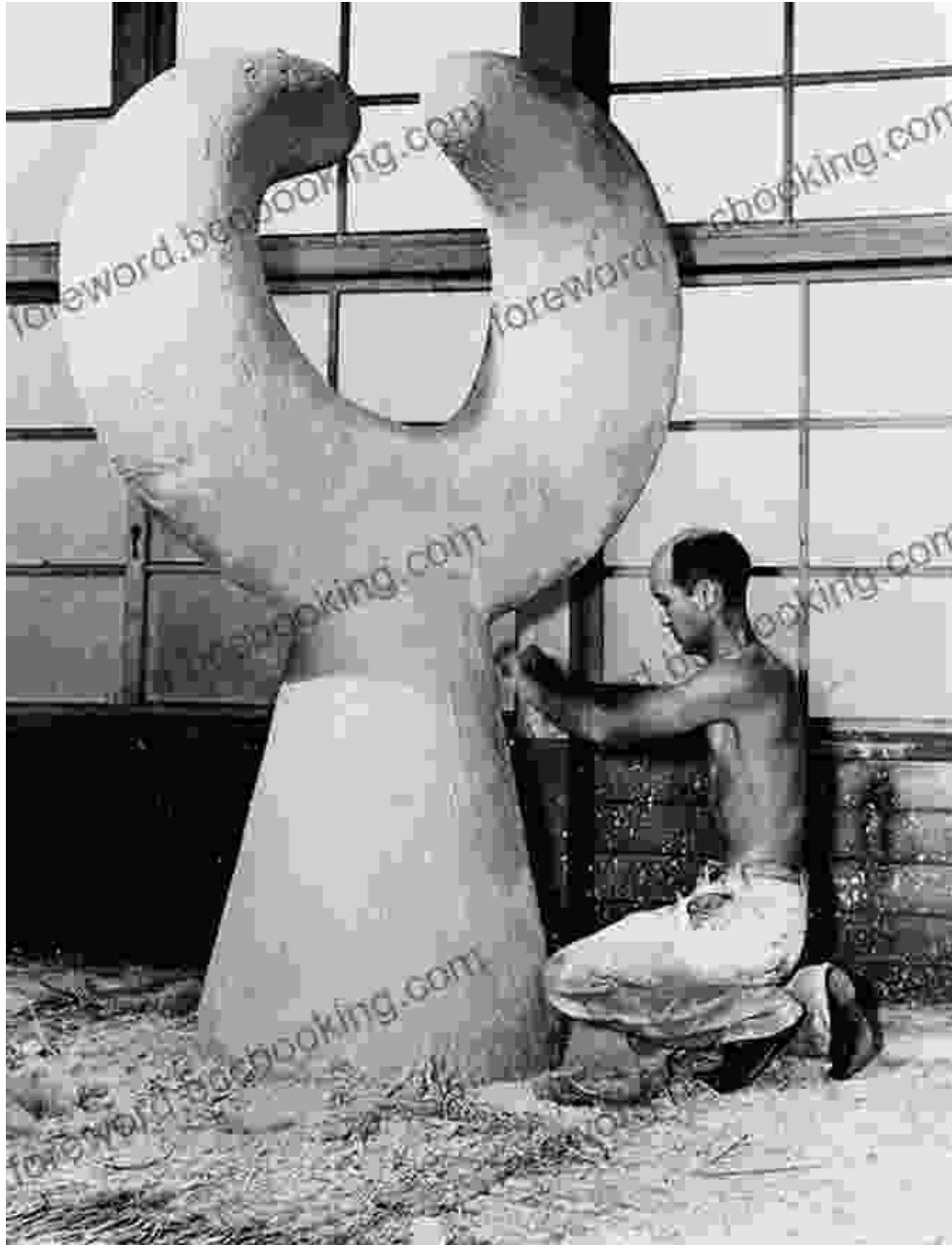
